

# Welcome

Murray, Nicky, Jake and Georgina would like to thank you for coming tonight. Your support is very much appreciated.

We cannot believe that a year has passed. Archie has achieved so much in the last 12 months; in November 2008 Archie started Nursery at Woodlands Special Needs School. WOW! What a school! Since joining Woodlands we feel that everyone is striving for the same goals: To give Archie the support he needs to reach his full potential, for him to gain independence - we now have a **team that works**.

Before Woodlands we spent 16 months in the Disablement Centre and unfortunately they failed Archie; it was a very frustrating and a disappointing experience.

In February/March of this year we made a decision to go to Dorset for private prosthetics, it was at a time where we had the funds and the knowledge. After 7 trips to Dorset Archie had his new legs (shoes). In May we felt it was the first day of the rest of his life, this was a very positive day.

Archie puts his new legs on every morning before school. The nursery staff and the physiotherapists keep them on for as long as Archie is comfortable, Archie needs to strengthen his stomach and buttock muscles as he has been on his bottom for 16 months. Archie receives physiotherapy everyday at Woodlands, he also has hydrotherapy twice a week and has access to the white and dark rooms, soft play and P.C. work.

Archie's vision has improved; he can track moving objects and is very interested in his environment. Archie will not accept any help; he would rather spend an hour doing something that should take 5 minutes than doing it with help; "Don't help Archie, I do it myself" he says.

In June we returned to Dorset for a checkup. The physiotherapist told us that Archie's lower back was working too hard and that he was not using his pelvis and his hips, so he had adjustments made to his legs. His legs are at a 15 degree angle to help his back and to improve pelvis and hip functions, the general idea is to reduce the degrees over the next few months.

Archie has a good balance; he tries to kick out to walk - he is very determined. We do not know how long it will take for Archie to walk but I do know it will be a big day for us; I'll want to announce to the world "My baby is walking again".

Thank you to Dorset (orthopaedic) and the staff at Woodlands School.

In May I had a meeting with Mr. Stephen Waite who is Chief Operating Officer of the Primary Care Trust. We discussed all the issues surrounding Archie's care with the Disablement Centre, I gave him my list of complaints about Archie's prosthetics and physiotherapy. The outcome of this meeting ended up with Archie's Dorset prosthetics being funded for a year by the Primary Care Trust, they have also agreed to improve the service for children requiring prosthetic support from an early age. This outcome was very pleasing

So for now there is no time for relaxing; we have got to keep fund-raising for Archie's future care.

# 'Don't mistake swine flu for meningitis'

A charity is urging people not to mistake the symptoms of meningitis with those of swine flu. The Meningitis Trust says that while both start out with common flu-like symptoms, telling the difference can be potentially life-saving.

Meningitis can strike in minutes and kill within hours. The rash commonly associated with meningitis does not appear in all cases, so it is vital people are aware of the other symptoms; fever (possibly with cold feet and hands), headache, stiff neck, dislike of bright lights, drowsiness, joint pain, diarrhoea and confusion. In babies an unusual cry, dislike of being handled and refusing feeds are also signs that can point to meningitis. If in doubt seek urgent medical advice.
